AIR RACE CLASSIC GEARS UP FOR 2018 RACE

Preparations are well under way for the 42nd Air Race Classic (ARC), the annual all-women cross-country airplane race, to be held June 19-22, 2018.

This year's race will begin in Sweetwater, Texas, where the Women Airforce Service Pilots trained for military service during World War II. The National WASP WWII Museum will host the racers at the Start as they get ready to wing their way to Alva, Oklahoma; Beatrice, Nebraska; Faribault, Minnesota; Galesburg, Illinois; Auburn, Indiana; Cadillac, Michigan; Newark, Ohio; Penn Yan, New York, and, finally, the Terminus at Fryeburg, Maine.

The Katahdin Wings Chapter and New England Section are looking forward to hosting the terminus in Fryeburg, Maine!

Rae and I recently took our first Road Scholar (Elderhostel) tour to Costa Rica and Panama. RS has been operating since 1975 out of Boston; it is not for profit, and runs tours all over the world. Part of the experience is education; we visited an organic farm, coffee plantation, learned about processing cocoa (chocolate!), sugar cane, paddled an outrigger canoe, and saw quantities of birds and other wildlife, including 15 ft. crocodiles. We walked through the treetops on hanging bridges near Arenal volcano.



In Panama we did a partial canal transit through 3 locks, saw the operation of the 2 year old new locks, spied howler monkeys and sloths, and rode a dugout canoe for 45 minutes to the village of the Embera people, who create beautiful

crafts from natural fibers, dyes, and also from mahogany wood.

Our tour group numbered 17 curious, fun, and entertaining traveling companions.

As some of you know, I've been looking for a solid old plane to purchase since I earned my private pilot certificate last November. It took six months of online research/calls/emails to find a 'keeper,' located at KEET, in Shelby, Alabama--a 1974 Piper Cherokee/Archer. I flew down with my instructor, picked it up, and flew it back.

Day One: On Monday (4/9), my flight instructor, Phil and I flew to Birmingham, AL. The owner picked us up, insisted we enjoy some southern BBQ before departing, and only then drove us to the airport where he has hangared the plane for the past 15 years. A gentleman, he topped off the tanks before we left, and wouldn't let me reimburse him. He spent hours going over the details of various cockpit instruments & the plane's quirks. Phil and I flew around the pattern once, then departed. She flies beautifully! We flew over 1100 miles in two long days. I flew the plane, and Phil handled the radios. We flew straight north to 6I2 (Kentucky) to refuel & stretch our legs. We left there as the sun was setting. Further north, we encountered snow, crossing Indianapolis. I'd never flown in snow before, and at night! We arrived at KSBN (South Bend, Indiana) shortly before midnight. My son Evan is in grad school there, which made it a good halfway point in this mom's opinion:)

Day Two (4/10): Evan picked us up in the morning, and after breakfast at his favorite place he gave us a quick tour of Notre Dame. It's a gorgeous university. We checked weather (again, and again). It was snowing back home, and in places between South Bend and CT. Phil filed an IFR flight plan and we left KSBN. Part of the flight back was VFR on top. I'd experienced that once before, flying in Santa Barbara last year. Later, ATC cleared us to 10,000 feet. Another first for me. I'd never flown that high. We landed at KBFD in PA to refuel. Flew through snowy grey skies, all IFR getting there. Checked weather again. From there, we flew back to Simsbury (4B9) VFR. Not sunny, not clear, but decent cloud clearances. Snowy grey skies & landscapes for much of the flight home.

11.8 hours of flying over two days, with a headwind on day one and a tailwind on day two, in all kinds of weather, VFR & IFR. Every single time I fly, I'm struck by what a beautiful country we live in, and how very, very fortunate I am to be able to experience it in small, slow airplanes. Magical.

(Of course we would love to have you join us!)

Who Are The Ninety-Nines?

The Ninety-Nines, Inc., is an international organization of licensed women pilots representing 35 countries - we currently have just under 5,000 members throughout the world. We are a non-profit, charitable membership corporation holding 501(c)(3) U.S. tax status. Our International Headquarters is located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Although there are other female pilot organizations in various states and nations, virtually all women of achievement in aviation have been or are members of The Ninety-Nines.

The organization came into being November 2, 1929, at Curtiss Field, Valley Stream, Long Island, New York. All 117 American female pilots had been invited to assemble for mutual support and the advancement of aviation. Louise Thaden was elected secretary and worked tirelessly to keep the group together as we struggled to organize and grow until 1931, when Amelia Earhart was elected as first president and the group was named for the 99 charter members.

Today Ninety-Nines are professional pilots for airlines, industry and government; we are pilots who teach and pilots who fly for pleasure; we are pilots who are technicians and mechanics. But first and foremost, we are women who love to fly!

Our Headquarters, located in a two story building complex on six acres at the Will Rogers World Airport in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, is home to our large archival records, video oral histories, personal artifacts, collections and memorabilia, and biographical files on thousands of women pilots from around the world. This is also the site of our 99s Museum of Women Pilots.
